## French Broad Baptist Group Offers Courses

The French Broad Baptist Association will offer two seminary extension college level courses beginning in February.

Courses will be held on separate evenings—Mondays and Thursdays—so that students may have an opportunity to enroll in more than one course.

Offered on Monday will be "Church Growth," an introduction to church growth principles and strategies as related to a church's sense of purpose. The association calls the course "ideal for all church leaders."

The course will be held on Monday evenings, Feb. 9 through April 13, from 7 p.m. to 9 p.m. The cost per person is \$10, and per couple is \$15.

Jerry Freeman will teach the course at the French Broad Baptist Center.

"How To Understand The Bible," an introduction to the nature and purpose of the Bible and how to understand it, will be offered on Thursdays, from 7 p.m. to 9 p.m. Feb. 12 through April 16.

The course will be taught by Sue Fitzgerald at Weaverville Baptist Church. The cost of the course is \$15 per person, and \$20 per couple.

Participants in the course are asked to register on Feb. 9 and 12 at the location of the course. The cost covers the price of books, materials and operation expenses.

# Pack Named E.B. Kennedy Scholar

Brent Pack, son of Mr. and Mrs. Britton Pack, Route 3, Mars Hill, has been awarded an E.B. Kennedy Scholarship to Erskine College.

Pack is recipient of a full academic merit scholarship including all tuition, room, board, fees and books. The scholarship is valued at more than \$35,000 for four years.

A senior at Madison High School, Pack was selected from among 94 semifinalists in a nationwide competition, nominated by their high school principals and guidance counselors. Twenty-three of these semi-finalists were invited back to Erskine and four winners of the full scholarships were chosen.

Other E.B. Kennedy Scholarship winners are Mindy Douglas of Pickens, S.C., a senior at Pickens High School; Kevin Burrell of Stanley, a senior at East Gaston High School in Mount Holly; and, Stephen Smellie of Naples, Fla., a senior at Lely High School.

E.B. Kennedy Scholarship winners are chosen on the basis of Christian commitment, leadership potential, academic accomplishment and vigorous outlook. The program is funded by the Edward C. Stuart Foundation Inc. of Bartow, Fla., and

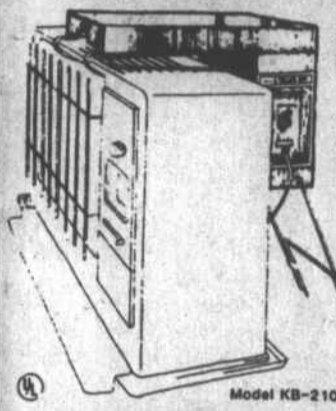

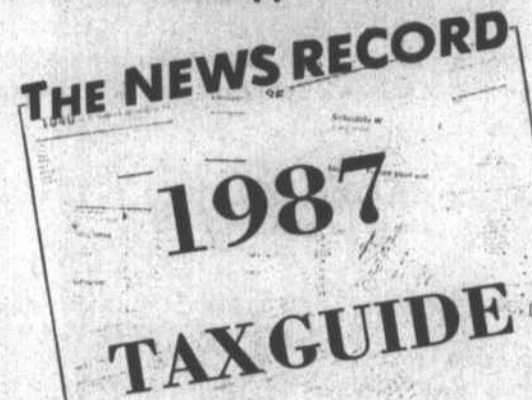

## Let Children Be Children

She was four, that wiggly and giggly age, and attended a child care day school. One day she came home with a note from her teacher. "Your daughter is a little immature," the teacher wrote.

The mother read and re-read the note, getting hotter with each reading. Finally she dashed off a note to the teacher: "If my daughter cannot be immature at four, when can she?"

Indeed!

Parents and teachers need to hear the words of Apostle Paul anew: "When I was a child, I talked like a child, I thought like a child, I reasoned like a child. . . ." (1 Cor. 13:11)

We need to let children be children; to let them act and re-act as children. Demanding adult behavior from children denies them their childhood, a phase of life everyone must go through—sooner or later.

The greatness of the Apostle is perhaps in no small measure traceable to a satisfying childhood in which he was allowed, no doubt encouraged, to be a child.

He gave it up to be a man, he said. But at one time he WAS UNASHAMEDLY A CHILD.
