THE SCOUTS ARE COMING INTO THEIR OWN

At last the local troop of Boy Scouts is coming into its own. The proper scouting spirit, the get up and go, the vim, and all the other essentials of real scouting are being acquired by all the boys in the two patrols, and the fact bids fair that some real work will be done in the near future.

About two years ago the troop was organized with H. S. Freeman as Scoutmaster, and just after organizing did some notable work in this community and built up a good troop. However, as it will do in such organizations, in the past few months interest has slackened and the boys have not been alive in the work, as they were at first.

If you want to avoid trouble with the government better make your income tax returns before April 1st. Single men, whose income from any source was as much as \$1,000.00 last year must pay an income tax; or if you are a married man and your income last year was \$2,000.00 or more, you must report it before April 1st, or be subject to a fine or imprisonment, or both.

SPECIAL TAX ELECTION

On Monday, March 4th, the county commissioners called an election to be held on April 25th, which, if carried, will allow the commissioners to levy a special tax of 15 cents on the hundred dollars worth of property and 45 cents on the poll.
