WEST HARNETT IN CELEBRATION OF PROGRESS

In celebration of the progress already made by Western Harnett, and anticipating its further material development, citizens of that section to the number of some three hundred gathered at Pineview last Friday and joined in a jubilee over the accession to their ranks of the Moss Brothers and associates composing the Never-Fail Land Company. A large number of visitors were also present, Mr. James A. Harps coming from his home in Greenfield, Ohio, a distance of eight hundred miles, to attend the event.

Satisfaction over the coming of the Moss Brothers was no greater, however, than the happiness of the people of that section because of the great friendship and interest the Harps Brothers have manifested for Harnett County. The Messrs. Harps have been and are, intensely interested in Harnett County and its material welfare. These are not empty words. They have demonstrated it. Great good has come, and will come, from Harps Brothers' association with and participation in this county's forward stride.

The Harps Brothers have transferred their holdings in West Harnett, consisting of some 8,000 acres, to the Never-Fail Land Company. On the cultivated area there are 64 barns and six pack houses for the housing of tobacco alone. One hundred and fifty acres are planted in tobacco this year, this being somewhat less than usual, 200 being the average last year. One year over 400 acres was put to tobacco. The land yields approximately 700 pounds to the acre, which always brings top market prices.

On the lawn of the Harps home at Pineview a velvety green covering of hops and Japanese clover furnish the best relief for one of the most beautiful of farm home scenes. Just back of the house there are Elberta peach trees which yield fruit of the very finest. Built upon the summit of the hill a few yards from the street, the Harps home commands a fine view of the surrounding territory and from the porch can be witnessed a veritable hive of industry as the farm contingent—some 200 in number, make things grow and move to market.

The welcoming remarks of Gen. B. S. Royser of Oxford put the assembly in hearty good humor, and when Mr. James Harps added his good wishes, good wishes and good cheer, there arose a shout of applause from the happy throng who partook of barbecue and shared in welcoming the newcomers as well as extending hearty congratulations and thanks to

Mr. Harps for his unselfish devotion to the upbuilding of the community. The Moss Brothers, managing for the Never-Fail Land Company, take over everything in the way of realty belonging to the farm and will begin immediately in its further development. The actual possession in entirety will not take place until January 1st, the Harps Brothers owning the crops of this season. Five hundred to 1,000 acres additional will be put under cultivation.

The Moss Brothers are public spirited. Following up Mr. Harps' building of roads and other public benefits, the Never-Fail Land Co. has donated two acres as a site for the new school. A site has also been tendered for a house of worship.

Mr. James Harps made the hearts of Harnett citizens glad when he uttered the significant remark: "I am not turning with Harnett County, but turning to Mr. Hiram Baggett, who negotiated the transfer, he

said: "When you know of anything that I can handle it, I am more than satisfied with your transaction." In a quiet way the new concern takes over the property spoke to Mr. Harps in like manner. Mr. James Harps owns the Never-Fail automobile factory, the Never-Fail Oil Can factory, the Never-Fail Suspension factory, and has other interests. His brother, Mr. John Harps, has been the genius in making the Pineview property what it is today. Another brother, Mr. George Harps, operates a veritable farm near March, N. C.
