### Coal At New Maximum

Washington, D. C., Nov. 7.-Soft coal moduction for the week of Oc-tober 30 was 122,338,000 tons, a new maximum for the year, figures made public teday by the United States Geological Survey show. For four consecutive weeks the daily output has averaged better than 2,000,000. tons, the longest period on record of ustained output at that rate except during the summer of 1918.

Anthracite preduction during the same week was 1,696,000 tons, a decrease of 219,000 tons from the proceeding week. This was due, it was said, to observance of the Mitchell Day Holiday, October 29, commemorating the settlement of the great anthracite strike of 1902.


