A Giant Tree Has Fallen
A giant has fallen. The Lafayette, the tallest tree in the Calaveras Grove, 300 feet high, with a diameter of 80 feet at its base, has yielded to the wind, and lies on the ground. This tree was one of the sequoias, those towering redwoods of California. Edwin Markham has described them thus: "They are the Titans of our forests, the Titans of the forests of the world. The sequoias are the survivors of a world-old family or race of trees which flourished back in the Mesozoic before the Age of Ice. But they all perished in the Glacial Age, except a few in a sheltered canon in the southern belt of California. The Calaveras Grove in the north is one of the world's John Bull's, estimated at the age of a certain sequoia in the King's River Forest at 4,000 years. This tree had been buried down. These monarchs of the woods should be carefully guarded, from commercial raids as well as otherwise."


