Gentry and Nash have the contract for all of the construction except the plumbing and steam fitting, which was awarded to Bell and Miller, a local plumbing concern.

P. E. Davis, an engineer in the employ of the Carolina Power and Light Company, has practically completed purchase of right-of-way for the company's lines between Dunn and Benson and expects actual construction to be started within the next few days. The company hopes to take over the operation of the local system by the middle of April. Its contract with the town calls for services here within ninety days from the date of the election through which the contract was ratified by the voters. The town is to receive \$45,000 for the electric system and electric current users are to be permitted a large saving in bills for current under the contract.

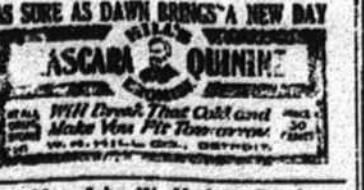

Winchester, Pa., March 15.—Rather than ride in the "Jim Crow" compartment of a Pennsylvania railroad train from the state to this city, Charles S. Gilpin, negro actor, and his troupe quit the train at Clearbrook, Va., and made the rest of the trip to Winchester by automobile. When the conductor told Gilpin the Virginia State requirements in regard to negro passengers a heated argument is said to have followed which resulted in some quotations from President Harding's expressed

views on the negro question. The conductor refused to be persuaded by the arguments. Gilpin got off and his company followed.
