In the event of the retirement of
Hon. O. H. Allen, Judge of the Su-
perior Court of the Sixth Judicial

sented for your consideration the ap-
pointment of Hon. Henry E. Faison,
Clinton, N. C., as the successor of
Judge Allen. His legal attainments,
character and judicial temperament

It now seems fitting and proper
that the citizens of Sampson County
should unite the lawyers of the
county, whose convictions are so
strongly stated above, and ask the
Governor of the district to make our
candidate their candidate, and place
him in the excited and highly im-
portant office of confidently believing that
he will measure up to the standard
set by McKoy, Herring and Allen, and
discharge the duties of the high po-
sition honestly and well.

Dear Mr. Daniels:
Some weeks ago an item ap-
peared in the state press to the effect that
Judge Oliver H. Allen was thinking
of retiring from the bench and set-
ting upon the idea that the report was
true, friends of Henry E. Faison be-
came interested in having him take
the place of Judge Allen.

It turns out that the rumor was
founded, at least for the present,
and I am sure Judge Allen and his
friends fully understand that Mr.
Faison would only consider the mat-
ter of asking for the place at all
when it was known that Judge Allen
was voluntarily retiring; in view of
the cordial relations and warm friend-
ship that have long existed between
Mr. Faison and Judge Allen.

I am writing you to ask that you
keep in mind the possibility of Judge
Allen's voluntary retirement, and
should this occur, I very much hope
you can give Mr. Faison your support
as the successor of Judge Allen. I
am inclined to believe Governor Mc-
Koy would favorably consider him
for there will probably be a number
of applicants from which a choice
must be made.

I know practically all the lawyers
of this district and without prejudice
to any of them believe that Mr. Fai-
son would make perhaps the best all
round Judge of them all, certainly
as good as any, and his long practice
at the bar, his temperament and
soundness of judgment, and
trustworthy will be able to give
the Faison your support should the
contingency arise when a successor to
Judge Allen will have to be named.
