

PINCHOT VICTORY DAZES OLD GUARD

(By Edward E. Britton in News and Observer)

Washington, May 17.—The "Old Guard" of Republicanism is shaken to its very foundation. Benten out of the boots, the G. O. P. machine in Pennsylvania is dashed as it tries to figure out what has happened to it. Gifford Pinchot, insurgent and until the last two years a progressive of the Bull Moose herd, has kicked Attorney General Geo. E. Altar, the candidate of the Old Guard for nomination as the Republican candidate for Governor of Pennsylvania. The Harding administration is hard hit by the blow, for it had been bestowing its smiles on Attorney General Altar, reactionary, holding him to be one of the leaders of Republicans who has so long been belittled by the late Senator Boies Penrose.

"It is a progressive victory of the most striking kind," is the general sentiment among the Republicans of the progressive type in Congress and as such it is also hailed by Democrats in Congress. It was the general opinion here during the day that even if Pinchot had only run close to Altar it would have been a progressive victory, but the complete unshoring of the Republican machine in Pennsylvania by Pinchot is regarded as a progressive runaway, and a disastrous rout of the Old Guard. The result is another severe jolt to the administration, a worse repudiation of it than the repudiation of the Old Guard by the Republicans in the primaries in Maine and Indiana. It is an increased condemnation of the present Republican National administration and it heralds Democratic leaders and Democratic privates.

Started in North Carolina North Carolina has some special interest in the success of Gifford Pinchot, "forester," as he describes himself, for he began first systematic forest work in Biltmore in January, 1892. A prime mover for the conservation of the natural resources of the United States his victory is a notice to Secretary of the Interior Fall that private exploitation of American holdings is wanted.

Chairman Cordell Hull, of the Democratic National committee is emphatic in declaring that Pinchot's nomination is a rebuke for the Republican organization in State and nation. He issued a statement tonight which reads in part:

The success of the Pennsylvania Republicans in revolting against the reactionary leadership of their party, following the lead in Indiana. Republics, in nominating a former Bull Moose leader, is a rebuke for the party organization in the State and a rebuke for the party organization in the nation.

The reported defeat of six administration candidates for Congress emphasizes the rebuke to the national administration.

Means Repudiation of Harding The regular Republican organizations in Pennsylvania and Indiana now destroyed were controlling factors in the Republican National convention of 1920 and have been functioning in closest political, personal and social co-operation with the present National administration.

The leaders of the corrupt Pennsylvania machine have enjoyed the high favor of the Harding administration. The appointment of President Harding's Secretary of the Treasury is commonly accredited to the late Senator Penrose, who until his death was the head and front of the Pennsylvania machine and one of the guiding spirits of the Harding administration.
