

Major Geiger Makes Fast 1,000 Mile Trip; Stopped Over At Fayetteville

Washington, May 27. — Aviation experts of the Marine Corps claimed today for Major Roy C. Geiger, U. S. M. C., the record for time and long distance North and South flying by virtue of his flight from Quantico, Va., to Pensacola, Fla.

Major Geiger left Quantico, thirty miles south of Washington, at 4:40 a. m. and arrived at Pensacola at 3:30 p. m., having made two stopovers aggregating about two hours in all, at Fayetteville, N. C., and at Americus, Ga. Each of the stops were for fuel. The flight was made at an average speed of 110 miles an hour, which the Marine Corps aviation experts say may be a world's record for speed over such a distance—in the neighborhood of 1,000 miles.

Keep History Straight

I regret the necessity for calling to the attention of the voters of Harnett County a few facts which are being misrepresented by over-zealous friends of my opponents.

1st. A few facts with reference to myself:

I was born in New Jersey, and when a few months old my parents moved to South Carolina where I attended the public schools at Bishopville and the high schools at Charleston. My father died when I was 13 years old, and 5 years later my mother died, leaving a small estate, which, by agreement among all my brothers and sisters, went exclusively for the care and maintenance of my 2 younger brothers and 1 younger sister. I was immediately, therefore, confronted with the necessity of making my own way in the world. At 21 years of age I married a young lady at Four Oaks, N. C., still with a determination to finish my education and study law, I shortly thereafter entered Wake Forest College, securing my license to practice law at the Fall term 1915. I have had no financial assistance, either during this time or since, from friends or relatives. Nevertheless I DEFY MY OPPONENTS TO IMPEACH MY INTEGRITY.

2nd. A few facts with reference to my residence, etc.:

It is going on seven years since I moved into Harnett County from Johnston. I began the practice of law at Coats in 1916 (Spring.) Since residing here I have served for two terms as Mayor of Coats. I have been chairman and served in other capacities on Red Cross, War Savings Stamps and Liberty Loan Committees. During the war I made no less than 25 speeches in various parts of the County in behalf of the thing. (Read below a copy of letter received by me from War Department.) My younger brother (who was then unmarried) served more than two years in France and my sister was engaged in war work at Washington.

3rd. A few facts with reference to my connection with Recorder's Court:

In 1919, Col. Dan Hugh McLean appointed me solicitor of the Recorder's Court upon recommendation of the County Commissioners, which office I held for 2 years. In the Fall elections of 1920 Col. McLean was re-elected as Recorder, and appointed Marshall Spears as Solicitor, while I was appointed by the County Commissioners as Vice-Recorder, an office which paid no salary. Some six months later Col. McLean died and I was appointed to fill his unexpired term, which I am now doing. How well I have filled this office is to the judgment of the citizens of Harnett County. I have endeavored to discharge the duties of the office without fear or favor, I have punished no one for malice, I have left no one unpunished because of friendship, relationship or for any other cause. I do not deny that I may have made some mistakes, but this is due to human fallibility. My opponents say that they will make no mistakes—presumably they are infallible. Believing that my experience has qualified me to best fill the office—I ASK YOUR SUPPORT.
