Father Of Co-Operative Marketing Idea Holds Stage Of Second Day

### MADE BIG HIT IN EAST CAROLINA IN SPRING

Down the straightaway they go, to swerve around the bend with the spinning wheels of the sulkies sloughing up the dust; then the long stretch on the far side of the track, each straining to beat the field to the inside of the final turn before making the home stretch.

This year all good horse lovers are promised races at the Dunn Fair that will thrill. Never has a better program been prepared for the local race track. Twelve races in all are on the card. They are as follows: Tuesday—2:25 trot, male trot, pony running. Wednesday—2:24 pace, 2:22 trot, horse running. Thursday—free for all trot, and pace, 2:20 trot and pace, male trot. Friday—consoling harness race for all horses which have not been in the money in preceding races, male running, horse running.

John W. Drughan will be official starter for the races. Granville M. Tilghman will be the official time keeper.

The local track was never in better condition than it is now. Ed Warren and Cap'n Mason have had a big force of men out there this week and have gotten all the kinks out of the course. The track is one of the best in the circuit. It was constructed at a cost of thousands of dollars and is the pride of the fair association.

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## TOURNAMENT TO BE FAIR FEATURE

Winner In Ring Joust Will Choose And Crown Queen Wednesday

The Queen of the Fair is to preside over the opening each day of the fair. She, and her court to be chosen by herself, will have entrance to all of the shows, etc., free of charge.

Many young women of the Dunn District are interested in the event. The jousts are open to all comers. All that is necessary to entrance is the possession of a horse and the ability to ride.

Dick Taylor, chief marshal, and Captain I Roland Williams have charge of the tournament. Any person who desire to enter, must communicate with them on or before Monday, October 9.

## MAN WANTED 44 YEARS FOR MURDER CAPTURED

Joe Kemp Arrested in Florida and Will Be Brought To Robeson County

Red Springs, Sept. 27.—Joe Kemp, who 44 years ago shot and killed Daniel E. McNeill, of this place, has been captured in St. Augustine, Fla., and will be brought to Robeson county at once for trial, according to advices received here. He waives requisition papers, it is said, and will return with the sheriff.

This happened in what is now the corporate limits of Red Springs. McNeill was in the woods cutting hoop poles. Kemp went down where McNeill was and the killing occurred there. Kemp left at once and was not heard of since until captured. Mr. McNeill has one son, J. T. McNeill, of this place, also two sisters and one brother living.
