**NEW STAPLE COTTON
BUYER ON THIS MARKET**

L. C. Groves, of Groves Cotton Com-
pany, Gastonia, Establishes
Branch Office Here.

Announcement of the intention of
the Groves Cotton Company, of Gas-
tonia, to establish a branch office in
Dunn for the purpose of purchasing
long staple cotton from the farmers
was made today by B. O. Townsend,
manager of the General Utility Com-
pany, in whose offices L. C. Groves,
president of the company will estab-
lish his headquarters here.

Mr. Groves is expected to arrive
here within a few days. His coming
will add greatly to the strength of
the local market which already leads
all others in inland North Carolina.
There are nearly a dozen cotton com-
panies represented on the open mar-
ket here. These have purchased
more than 7,000 bales from farm wa-
rens on the local yard and several
other thousands of bales at Duke,

Coats, Godwin, Benson and other
by markets.

Mr. Groves is an expert long sta-
ple grader and will pay to the farm-
ers the very highest prices for their
cotton. It is stated. His company
goes directly to the cotton mills and
has unlimited resources, it is said.
