

LISTEN GIRLS: HERE'S ADVICE AS TO SORT OF MAN TO MARRY

New York.—In a talk on "What sort of a man is it safe to marry?" the Rev. John M. Moore, pastor of the Marcy Avenue Baptist church, at Marcy Avenue and Madison Street, Brooklyn, gave the following rules for girls to follow:

4. Don't marry a man who doesn't respect womanhood.

9. Don't marry a man who has led a fast life.

"The man whom it is positively safe to marry" added Dr. Moore, "is the man whom you know to be a gentleman and chivalrous; whom you love and who loves you; a man who is self-controlled, a saving sense of humor and, most important of all, a man the stamp of whose life and character leads and habits a good woman is willing to have her children be like."

WHENBY DEALER LIABLE FOR DAMAGE

Madison, Wis., Nov. 8.—Damages resulting from the consumption of intoxicating liquor may be collected by the injured person from the dispenser of the illicit liquor, the Wisconsin Supreme court decided in affirming a lower court award of \$3,500 to Mrs. Helen Smithers of Fond Du Lac county, for injury to her husband.

The court held that both exemplary and compensatory damages could be assessed against the saloon keeper who sold intoxicating liquor in violation of the law.

Justice Owen declared that disregard of the law by the dispenser of intoxicants justified severe treatment for him. He held that the \$3,500 award to Mrs. Smithers was not excessive.

OVERHAUL YOUR CAR BEFORE WINTER

"Now is the time the motorist should overhaul his car," declares Emmett K. Thompson, local dealer in Durant Four and Six cylinder models. It makes no difference whether he is going to place it in storage, or drive it throughout the winter. This practice should be observed anyway.

"After such hard work and continuous driving that the average automobile experiences during the spring and summer months, the car needs inspection and tuning up before the winter grind begins. The car owner usually fails to realize that unless his car is gone over, his service in the colder months will suffer materially.

"Fundamentally, the automobile is a piece of machinery, subject to wear. To get the best results, this machinery must be looked after regularly.

"With the coming of colder days, the automobile will be subjected to even greater trials. The weather and the conditions of the roads will make driving harder. The car should be 'tuned up' to meet this situation, else the motorist will suffer many inconveniences.

"Continued emergency repairing is irritable even in the summertime. In the winter, it is regarded as a hardship.

"There are many things which the car owner must attend to before he can be assured of continued service during cold season. The oil should be changed for a different grade to be used throughout. The radiation sys-

tem should be cleared with a good cleaning lotion, for this will remove the scale or deposit of mud accumulated during the summer months. An anti-freeze mixture should be prepared for the radiator.

"The hazards of driving increase in the winter time and every precaution should be taken to avoid accidents. The snow-storm; sleazy roads and bitter weather must be encountered. The motorist should go over his brakes to make sure of their soundness. Equip the wheels with chains. Also test the wheels to see that they are true, for if they are not, it is rough for the tires. Such accessories as the curtains, the heater, hand-warmers, and the like should be put in shape.

"After a thorough overhauling of his car now the owner will not want to put it in storage for he will find driving in the winter as pleasant as in the summer.

COMMERCIAL CANNING

The farm women of Greenwood County, South Carolina, are canning for a wholesale grocery company at the county seat. They are filling an order for 1,500 cases of tomatoes, 300 cases of kraut, 65 cases of beets, 300 cases of soup mixture, 275 cases of blackberries, and 30 cases of pie peaches. They are also canning fig preserves and soup mixture for the South Carolina Home Producers' Association. This work, noted in a report to the United States Department of Agriculture, has been done according to the methods taken to these rural women by extension agents.


