DEATH OF Mcd. HOLLIDAY, PRESIDENT OF THE HARDWARE ASSOCIATION OF THE CAROLINAS

McD. Holliday, a member of the firm of Barnes and Holliday Co., of Dunn, N. C., the president of the Virginia and North Carolina Implement Dealers' Association, died at a hospital at Wilmington, N. C., on September 20, following an operation. His sudden death came as a great shock to a host of friends throughout the southeastern states, where for many years he has been very prominent in association work and has been widely known as one of the South's most progressive business men.

Mr. Holliday's activities may best be summed up in the work of T. W. Dixon, secretary-treasurer of the Hardware Association of the Carolinas, who comments as follows in a letter concerning the death of the President of the association.

"Mr. Holliday was born in Pitt county, North Carolina and at the age of nineteen went to Dunn as a teacher in the public schools. From this beginning he was connected with several different business enterprises until 1908, when he together with J. D. Barnes, Ray Cromartie and others organized the Barnes & Holliday Co. for the sale of hardware and kindred lines at Dunn. This venture proved a success. Mr. Holliday established two other hardware and furniture stores in other towns of the State.

"Realizing the good to be derived from association activities, Mr. Holliday identified himself with such associations as pertained to the lines he carried, and at one time was president of the Merchants Association of the Carolinas and Virginia.

"Kind hearted and of a genial disposition he met everyone with a smile, and was always optimistic of the future.

"The Carolina's Association has lost a most valuable member."—Merchants Journal.
