Clinton, Dec. 31.—Induction into the office of judge of the Superior Court here tomorrow will not change Henry A. Grady's belief that whether he is a member of the Ku Klux Klan or not is none of anybody's business, so long as he performs the duties of the office to which he has been elected. He will hold his first session of court in Craven county a week from tomorrow.

Recent efforts to induce judge elect Grady to affirm or deny the statement made by Dr. Oscar Hayward that he is the titular head of the Invisible Empire in North Carolina have been unavailing. Friends of Mr. Grady had expected that he would make a formal statement before he assumed the duties of the judgeship, but it is understood here tonight that he will maintain his silence.
