RIDDLE TO LEAVE DUNN Thomas L. Riddle, secretary of the Dunn Chamber of Commerce since its inception three years ago, has resigned his position and, with the holding of the annual meeting of the organization this week when his successor will be named, will leave for Sanford, where he will engage in private business. Mr. Riddle has been one of the most active in North Carolina. For three years he has worked for Dunn and the great farming community which surrounds it. Few enterprises in the town and few farms in the surrounding country have not felt the beneficial effects of his work. During his residence here Dunn has prospered in spite of the two lean years of business depression; the community has built new schools, scores of new homes, a dozen stores. New enterprises have been attracted and the old ones encouraged. Mr. Riddle leaves a better Dunn than he found, and the community regrets his decision to give up secretarial work. Mrs. Riddle and their two little daughters will remain here until the public schools close in June. Then they will join Mr. Riddle at the new home in Sanford.

This year it is on growing 1,842,978,000 worth more products in 1922 than 1921.
