FOUR NEGROES BURNED TO DEATH AT WINSTON

Winston-Salem, Feb. 14.—In a fire tonight in Wauchoy, a colored suburb of Winston-Salem, Melvin Grant, negro woman, and negro children, Moses and Mary Smith, twins, were burned to death. Belle Lindsey, a negro woman, was burned and died while being hurried to the hospital. The building caught fire from a heating stove and being a light frame structure, was wrapped in flames before help could be summoned.
