In a dispatch recently sent out from the North Carolina College for Women it was noted that Harnett county had fourteen students enrolled in that institution this year. Johnston has eleven, Sampson twenty and Cumberland twelve.

Four whiskey stills, three copper and one galvanized outfit, have been captured this week by A. B. Adams, special prohibition agent of Dunn. One of the stills was captured in lower Little River township, Harnett county, while the other three were captured in Johnston county. Approximately 1,500 gallons of beer found about the stills were poured out by the officer. No arrests were made.

Spot cotton reached the highest level since 1920 on the Dunn market today, several bales being sold for 29 1/2 cents the pound. Cotton sold on the local market Wednesday for 29 1/4 cents, when it was quoted on some of the leading markets in the State at 29 cents. A jump of one-half cent is necessary to bring cotton into parity again. Quite a bit of cotton is being sold on the local market this week.

Nat A. Townsend and Geo. K. Grantham, both of Dunn, are among those nominated by a joint committee of the house and senate Wednesday as members of the board of trustees of the State university. Mr. Grantham is at present a member of this board having served since 1918, while Mr. Townsend is one of the leading figures in the lower house of the present legislature. The board of trustees will be elected by the general assembly in joint session next week.

The Great Atlantic and Pacific Tea Company will open a store in the Shell building, East Broad street, tomorrow (Saturday) morning. This company which began business 64 years ago, now has a total of 7,052 stores throughout the country and it is planned to increase the number of stores to 10,000 during the present year. Two stores are operated in Fayetteville, four in Raleigh and one in several other North Carolina towns and cities. A complete line of groceries is carried in each of the stores, which are conducted on the "cash and carry" plan. W. R. Brodie, who comes to Dunn from Springfield, S. C., will be in charge of the local store, while Douglas Butts of Dunn will be assistant manager.
