

THE LAW IN CUMBERLAND

Sheriff N. H. McGee's war on the moonshiners of Cumberland county has cost the life of another deputy—the fifth in seven years to be killed in the course of prohibition enforcement raids, and the sixth of McGee's deputies to die with his boots on. In two cases the slayer intended to get the sheriff himself; the first as we recall, mistook his man and killed a deputy thinking he was shooting the sheriff; the second missed McGee by a hair's breadth and killed the deputy standing beside him.

But the war goes on. The sheriff of Cumberland county is a Scot, whose forefathers came out of the Highlands, and he is endowed with all the grim tenacity of the Highland Scotch. His kind do not take an oath lightly; and when Hector McGee swore to enforce the law, the only possible means of preventing him from enforcing to the utmost of his ability would have been to kill him.

There is one phase of the Cumberland record, however, that is especially noteworthy and especially admirable. With the bloody record that is behind them one would naturally expect to find McGee's officers hair-trigger men, ready to shoot at the drop of your hat. One would look for an organization all nerves. On the contrary, we do not recall a single instance of a Cumberland officer's drawing his gun when there was the slightest question of the necessity for his doing so. Nor with all the

killings has there been any lynching. Sheriff McGee and his men are handling law-breakers in Cumberland, without shooting men on suspicion or calling on mobs to help them. They are neither frightened nor excited; and while their method is costly in lives of brave men it strengthens and solidifies respect for the law and must all Cumberland citizens with justifiable pride.—Greensboro News.


