SCHOOL NEWS

There has been some moles among the school children in the city, but the disease has not become epidemic and has not seriously affected the attendance which has been unusually good the whole winter.

The eye clinic for the school children of Dunn was conducted by Dr. Hicks of Raleigh, on Thursday. There were 102 examinations made.

A majority of those examined were found to have good eye sight, yet some were found who had not more than 10 per cent normal vision. In every case of this kind, the child's record at school revealed the fact that his school progress was slow because of some physical defect.

The high school boys have had an excellent basket ball team this season. The final game for the county championship will be played at Lillington on March 24. The contest will be between the Dunn and Lillington teams.

The high school boys under the direction of Mr. Wright have begun their practice for the season's basketball. The school will no doubt, put out a strong team which will give a good account of itself.

On next Monday reports for the six weeks' period just ended will be sent to parents and guardians. It is hoped that these reports will be carefully examined, so that the parent may know whether his child is doing satisfactory work at school. Parents who are not satisfied with their children's reports are requested to visit the schools and talk over the matter with the superintendent and teachers and then co-operate with them in

securing better results. It may be that some children need to study more at home. In bringing this about the cooperation of parents is invaluable. Although the progress on the new grammar grade school has been very

slow, it is encouraging to know that the building will be completed and equipped before the opening of the schools in September. The building will be handsome and commodious and a credit to our community.

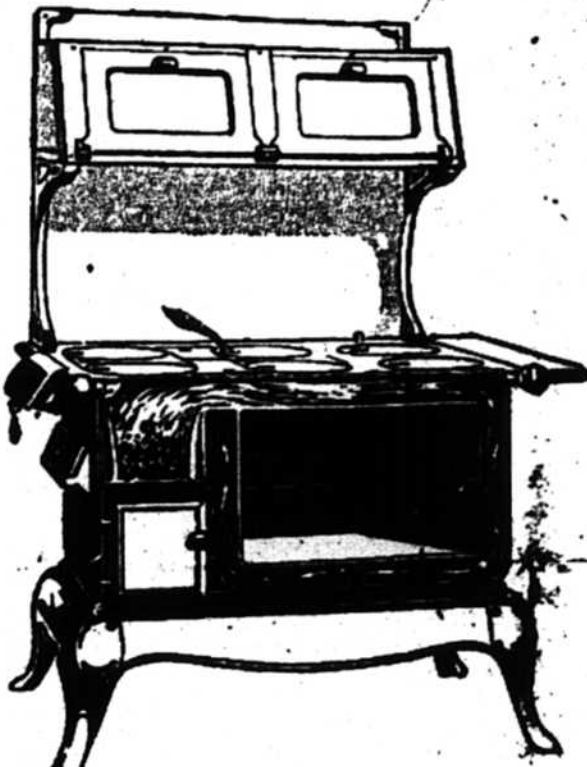

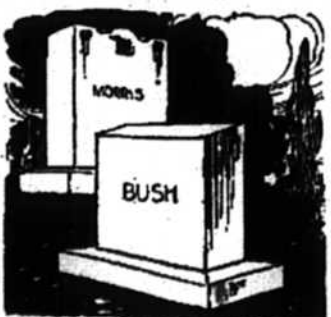
