The Dunn Roofing and Cornice Company, yesterday, was awarded the contract for doing the roofing and sheet metal work on the new school building to be erected at Jolley. The contract was awarded by Jones Brothers, contractors of Wilson.

The fire alarm was sounded about 9:30 o'clock Sunday morning on account of a blaze on the roof of Young Lee's residence, North McKay avenue. The flames were extinguished by the fire company before much damage resulted. It is thought the fire started from a spark from a chimney.

Work has been begun in remodeling the interior of the local municipal building in order to make more room for the recorder's court. The office of H. A. Parker, town clerk and treasurer will be moved into the old court room, while the present office of Mr. Parker will be converted into a court room. The change will give 20 feet more space for the recorder's court.

Rev. and Mrs. Billy Sunday passed through Dunn yesterday en route from Columbia, S. C., to Wilson, where the noted evangelist delivered the closing address of the Eastern Carolina Exposition at 3 o'clock in the afternoon. Both Mr. Sunday and "Ma" Sunday came out on the platform of the car while the train stopped here and shook hands with several local people.

Z. V. Snipes returned Friday night from Detroit, Michigan, where he attended a meeting of the Hudson-Exeter dealers from all parts of the country. The expense of the dealers was borne by the manufacturers of joyable trip, though he encountered factory made up a part of the program arranged for the visiting dealers. Mr. Snipes reports a most enjoyable trip, though he encountered some weather that was unusually cold to one from the Sunny South. It was 8 below zero in Detroit and much snow fell while he was there.

A large number of farmers Saturday witnessed a demonstration of the Walker spraying and mopping machine for cotton. The demonstration was "staged" on Lucknow square by George Holland, representing W. M. Smith and Co., of Benson, agents for this machine, assisted by W. J. Root of McColl, S. C. Mr. Root stated that he had recently sold 250 of the Walker sprayers in Marlboro and Dillon counties in South Carolina. The sprayer is drawn by one mule and sprays two rows of cotton at the same time. It is so constructed that the poison is spread on both the upper and under parts of the cotton leaf. The tank in which the liquid poison is carried holds 10 gallons, enough to cover 10 acres, according to Mr.

Holland. Many of the farmers who witnessed the demonstrations here expressed themselves as being favorably impressed with the machine.

THE WOMAN'S CLUB

The Home Economics Department of the Woman's club met Friday afternoon at three o'clock.

Mrs. Henry Lee, the newly elected chairman, presided and turned the program over to the girls from the home economics department of the high school, who took charge.

The girls arranged a very attractive exhibit consisting of some of the garments they had made, all that was displayed was done as class room work by the girls themselves.

A group of the girls had some lovely rag rugs to display and they crocheted on others during the afternoon for the interest and instruction of the ladies.

The process of making the rug is such a simple one that all homes should enjoy the attractiveness of several bright rugs in the bedroom. The girls explained that they had first dyed old pieces of clothing such as, sheets, old underwear, stockings the desired color, then tore them in strips one inch wide, and stitched them all together making a continuous string, then wound it into a ball. Just the chain stitch in crochet was used until the rug was the desired size.

The needles used were all homemade, some made by twigs, aluminum and some made from old knitting needles.

Several of the girls told what they had learned regarding construction of garments and how they had learned to know standard materials when buying.

Tea and wafers were served at the conclusion of the program.
