

**DEMOCRAT ELECTED**  
**MAYOR OF CHICAGO**  
 Chicago, April 8.—Judge William H. Dwyer, Democrat, was declared elected mayor of Chicago today by a plurality of more than 100,000 votes over Arthur C. Lander, Republican, in one of the quietest elections in the city's history. Late office with him went a democratic city clerk and a democratic city treasurer.

Bryant Allen Morgan, aged 79, died at the home of his daughter, Mrs. W. L. Avery, last Sunday from the infirmities of old age and other ailments with which he had been afflicted for several years. Mr. Morgan was one of the few surviving veterans of the Civil War, whose ranks are being rapidly thinned out. He served with distinction throughout the many battles, especially those around Richmond and Petersburg in the closing days of the war. It seemed as if it were a pleasure to him in the last few years to relate his experiences during the war. His own brother was killed while they were side by side in the trenches before Petersburg. Mr. Morgan once told this correspondent that his brother had had a dream the night before he was killed the following day that he would be shot and killed. He tried to persuade him that it was only a dream, but the older Morgan asked him in the event of his death to take his personal effects. Sure enough the next day the brother was shot and died within a few hours.

Surviving are one son and four daughters: J. C. Morgan, Mrs. W. L. Avery, Mrs. W. R. Avery, Mrs. E. E. Boyd and Mrs. Lillian Matthews all of Durham, N. C.
