DEATH OF MRS. J. C. DAWSON

On Monday, April 9th, at her home in Eureka, Mrs. John C. Dawson, nee Miss Myrtle Goff, died after a brief illness. She was the eldest daughter of Rev. and Mrs. H. H. Goff of Falcon, and had been married a little over two years. She would have been twenty-three years of age had she lived till the 30th of this month.

Her death was a shock to the family and friends, who had no intimation that she was ill till messages were received telling them that she was at the point of death. Her father was at the time in Bennettsville, S.C., holding an evangelistic meeting, and the word of her illness did not reach him sufficiently clear for him to realize the seriousness of it until she had died. Her mother went to her bedside as soon as possible after receiving the message, but did not reach Eureka till her daughter had become unconscious.

Mrs. Dawson is survived by her husband, a child a little over a year old, and an infant of two days, also by her father and mother and ten brothers and sisters. She was the niece of Mrs. J. A. Poole of Dunn.

The funeral services were held in the Methodist church of Eureka, the building being well filled, and the floral offerings abundant.

Miss Irene, a sister who is attending college at Elon, came to Dunn, and three automobile loads of friends from Falcon joined her here. This is the third time Miss Irene has been called home during her college life to the burial of a close relative, the first being her grandmother, then an uncle, and now, her sister.

FARMERS SHOULD PLANT GAR-DENS

What is a good garden worth to the average farmer? This is a hard question to answer, but every one knows that it is worth much more than the time required to make it. Now it is very necessary for everyone to grow what they eat, for there will be less money to buy food from the cotton crop, since the boll weevil have to have some of the money.

Plant something to eat, that you might have next winter instead of buying these canned vegetables from the grocery store. It is possible to grow during the summer very cheaply, vegetables which might be canned. These can be used when the vegetables are being shipped from Florida and selling at high prices.

There is little need for farmers becoming excited over the presence of the boll weevil. If the safe policy of growing all the food needed for the family, and the feed for the live-stock is followed, farmers will live as well or better than ever. It's a very poor policy to grow cotton only, and buy the food for the family and feed for the live-stock. It is hoped that the farmers of the Dunn district will not make this mistake. Thus I am calling attention to the danger of the one-crop system. Everybody should attempt to "live at home." Tell your neighbors.

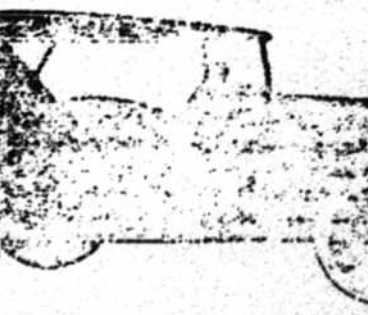
