

**MAKING MILK SAFE IS IMPORTANT JOB**

 ing centers alone. This means that the disease takes away from the people about 25,000,000 pounds of meat each year and of course is a factor of an immense economic importance. Hogs also get the disease when fed skim milk from an infected cow.  
 When cream is pasteurized at the creameries and done properly, the germs may be killed, but oftentimes this process is not faithfully done and the germs pass on to those who consume the cream, butter or cheese. With adults the danger of getting the infection is not so great because the older people use other foods than milk, but with the child the danger is great. In addition to the orphanage mentioned, the inspectors have found cases in Wayne and Cumberland counties which seem to show beyond all doubt that infection came to children from a herd having rickets among its number.  
 Dr. Vaughn has the reports of some scientific investigations made in another state which show that of 230 children under five years of age under observation, 68 had contracted abdominal tuberculosis from drinking infected milk and 68 had cases of generalized tuberculosis. Children from 5 to 16 were not so highly infected, but even with those, 50 among 125 were found to have the abdominal form of the disease, all traced to bovine origin.  
 The workers of the state college and state department of agriculture know that milk is one of the best foods that the human can use. It is a perfect food, when pure. But it should be pure and not from infected herds. That is why the movement is under way to make it pure by removing the source of infection. It is expected to take the work up county by county until all bovine tuberculosis is eradicated and then to keep it out of the state by having the proper protection from those selling cattle from other states.  
 Dr. Vaughn states that North Carolina is wise to begin in time while the records show that only between one and two per cent of our cattle are infected. The state is only spending from all sources, county, nation and state, about \$125,000 per year at this time. It is costing about 45 cents per head to test the cattle, with no cost to the owner. So had has the disease become in New York, however, that the state authorities are spending about five million dollars this year and Wisconsin has appropriated one million dollars for similar work. In Michigan where a plan similar to the North Carolina plan is being tried out, the authorities are asking the counties for \$25,000 where North Carolina is asking for only \$5,000.  
 Dr. William Moore and his associates believe that clean milk is better than cleaned milk and that with

the great demand for more milk in North Carolina, the consumers should be guaranteed that they are not being fed the germs of tuberculosis. In March the inspectors tested 10,700 head of cattle in 2,750 herds. Some of these were retests and of all tests made only 52 reactors were found. Eleven others were suspected and are now under quarantine. This work is a guarantee of better health in the state and also better economic conditions for the livestock producer.
