Buie's Creek Downed By Dunn High 13-0

(Reported) Although the weather was very fine, it did not stop the smashing attack of the Dunn football team upon the visitors from Buie's Creek last Friday afternoon, and the game ended in a one-sided victory for the local team of 13 to 0.

First Quarter. Dunn kicking off to Buie's Creek ten yard line, Dickson returning it ten yards. The visitors tried a forward pass and three forward plays without any gain. Pearson kicked twenty five yards to Newberry, who returned fifteen yards, ball on thirty yard line. Buie's Creek goes off right tackle for five yards. Wilson takes five more off left. Jackson goes fifteen more on cross back and kicked good. Newberry carried it over on an end run. Dunn 7, Buie's Creek 0.

Second Quarter. Dunn has ball on opponents' forty yard line. Newberry gets five yards on end run. Line back fails and two passes fail. Newberry picks over good line, ball on Buie's Creek twenty yard line in their possession. Enemy gained ten yards off tackle, but three line plays and end run failed and they kicked. Dunn returned ten yards. Dunn 7, Buie's Creek 0.

Third Quarter. Buie's Creek kicked off to Dunn, who on line plays advanced the ball to the thirty yard line when they lost the ball. Buie's Creek made ten yards through center and was forced to kick afterwards. Dunn failed to gain and kicked to Anderson, who fumbled the punt and Anderson, the big left tackle for Dunn, scooped the ball up and raced across the goal line. Dunn 13, Buie's Creek 0.

Fourth Quarter. Buie's Creek received and returned fifteen yards. Two plays failed and they punted. Dunn made first down on two plays, followed by first down on two more line plays. A forced pass was interrupted and Buie's Creek failed to gain. They attempted to punt, but it was blocked by Dorman, tackle for Dunn. The game ended here with Dunn in possession of the ball on twenty yard line. The Dunn team played well, and none can be called the "shining light." The visiting team also played good ball. Lee umpired the game, which was played on the race track enclosure at the fair grounds and was witnessed by a large number of football fans.
