

LEON HEAD IS GOOD TAR HEEL

Commander Quinn's Mother Was Robeson Co. Woman; Many Relatives Here

It will not be at all surprising to North Carolina to learn that John Robertson Quinn, newly elected National Commander of the American Legion, is a Tar Heel, a Robeson county Tar Heel and with a good deal of Highlander in him and a raft of uncles, aunts and cousins of varying degrees scattered throughout the State.

To be sure he was born in California, but his mother was a Robeson county Scotch lassie, and he has been back to North Carolina to see his relatives several times. His last visit to his people here was in 1921, but his mother crossed the continent last year. Commander Quinn is expected to come to North Carolina within the next few months.

There is something of romance in the marriage of the Commander's parents. Away back in the early days Archibald Patterson, a brother of the late Congressman Gilbert Patterson, left Maxton and migrated to California, where he has since lived, prospered and made many friends. Along in 1885 he came back on a visit, and with him he brought a young man by the name of Harry Quinn.

Quinn met Miss Hattie Robertson in Robeson county, and the return of the Scotchman to California was delayed until marriage could be staged. Quinn was born in Ireland but left there when a lad, drifted to Alaska and later to California, where he formed a close friendship with Mr. Patterson. The Commander is the second son, and was born in 1890.

G. T. Robertson, of Rowland, is an uncle of the Commander, and Mrs. Belle Burhan, of Sanford, an aunt. He has other relatives throughout the State who are very proud of him. And he himself is proud of the fact that he is at least half Tar Heel.—Raleigh News and Observer.

Aged Negress Found Dead From Exposure

Greensboro, Oct. 23.—The body of Amy Ross, aged negress, was found in a cornfield in the Oak Ridge section of Guilford county today when laborers went there to gather the crop, the woman having fled from the home of her daughter last Monday and perished from cold and exposure. For some time she had a delusion that the "white folks would get her." A man Monday drove to her daughter's home to buy chickens, and shortly afterwards the old woman disappeared and could not be found until today.

Organization Formed To Fight Boll Weevil

New Orleans, Oct. 26.—The National Boll Weevil Control Association was organized here today at the concluding feature of the National Boll Weevil Menace Conference, which began Wednesday at the call of the Louisiana Banker's Association.

The organization of the association will be perfected by an executive committee of 22 members representing 10 varied interests in the cotton industry and after appointment of a part of its members today, it immediately went into session and determined to meet in New Orleans November 17. At that time the entire personnel of the committee will have been named and steps will be taken to complete the organization of the larger body.

Senator Underwood Scores Ku Klux Klan

Houston, Texas, Oct. 26.—"When any group of men unite in a secret order to run the laws and the government, the nation strikes at the very heart of the government," Senator Oscar W. Underwood, candidate for the Democratic nomination for the Presidency, told a large gathering of active clubs here yesterday. "No class or clan can assume control over a democracy," the Alabama Senator added.

"Government must be free and in the open and not behind closed doors" said Senator Underwood. "It is all right to have organization for purposes of amusement, it is all right to have fraternal organizations and civic clubs, but when men have secret organizations for the purpose of governing them, then they are striking at the principles of government."

Hickory Boy Killed Result of Accident

Hickory, Oct. 26.—John A. Isenbower, Jr., eight year old son of former Sheriff and Mrs. John A. Isenbower, of Conover, died in a Hickory hospital today as the result of a wound in the stomach inflicted late yesterday afternoon while he was playing with other boys in the rear of the graded school at Conover. The bullet lodged in

his liver. The lad walked home with the 22 calibre pistol bullet in his body, and the parents were unable to learn how the accident occurred. It was said that the boy found the rifle in an abandoned house near the school grounds.

Mr. Isenbower rushed his son to the hospital here, but his injuries were mortal.

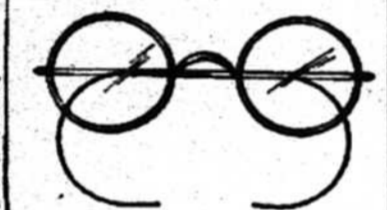
