Quickly Available Nitrogen Pays Best

Raleigh, N. C., Nov. 28.—Under best conditions there is need to produce as much fruit on the cotton as early as possible and have this fruit mature before the weevils get so numerous as to attack the green bolls. Anything which helps to produce this cotton quickly gives just that much advantage in the fight on the pest. With these ideas in mind John C. Anderson, county agent of Wake county, conducted a fertilizer test on the farm of A. E. Allen, near Cary, in which he found that nitrate of soda was a better source of nitrogen than cottonseed meal on that type of soil and under the conditions prevailing there. Dividing the application of nitrate gave very little advantage in this demonstration and according to workers of the agricultural experiment station will not pay generally over the State if made later than right after chopping the cotton to a stand.

According to Mr. Anderson, 896 pounds of seed cotton per acre was produced in plot one where 325 pounds of acid phosphate, 150 pounds of nitrate of soda and 25 pounds of muriate of potash were used. All the nitrate was used at one time before planting in this plot.

In plot two, 295 pounds of seed cotton per acre was produced where 325 pounds of acid phosphate, 75 pounds of nitrate of soda and 25 pounds of muriate of potash followed by an additional 75 pounds of nitrate at first working, were used. In both of these instances the fertilizer cost \$7.55.

In plot three, 264 pounds of seed cotton was produced where 300 pounds of acid phosphate, 200 pounds of cottonseed meal, 25 pounds of muriate of potash and 75 pounds of nitrate of soda were applied before planting. This fertilizer cost Mr. Allen \$10.74.

Mr. Anderson says that all plots were of the same size, on the same field and of the same type of soil. A good stand of cotton was secured and the plots were treated alike except for the difference in fertilizer.
