**FIRST TRACT:** Beginning on a stake in the center of the road leading from the late residence of the said J. A. Robinson and on top of the hill and runs S. 71° 15' W. two chains to a stake on top of said ridge; thence S. 12° E. 6 chains to a white oak; thence S. 88° E. 21.59 chains to a stake, Ford's line; thence N. 1° 30' E. 10 chains to a stake; thence N. 75° W. 18.60 chains to a stake in center of the road;

**The Weaking Of Tomorrow**



The undernourished child is the most important problem pressing for solution in our state today. Under-nourishment causes rickets (rickets), beriberi, pellagra, conjunctivitis, prevents procreation when extreme, repeats in school, truancy, delinquency, crime, insanity, coma and death. It causes disease of the following body structures,—bone, teeth, skin, hair, nails, mucous membranes of the alimentary tract, conjunctiva, sex organs, brain and nervous system and perhaps other structures of the body that we have not found out about at this time; for example: We know that an under-nourished person takes tuberculosis and other diseases more easily and more quickly than the well nourished.

There are 300,000 undernourished children in the schools of our state,—the percentage running from ten to fifty.

It has been thought by some that undernourishment is caused by disease or physical defects; for example: Malaria, diseased tonsils. On the other hand, some think that the under-nourishment is the cause of many defects, for example: Adenoids, hypertrophied tonsils, etc. Any way, all the disease and defects in an under-nourished child should be removed by a complete examination by a physician in order to find them out. Then with the Nutrition Clinics, National and North Carolina Tuberculosis Associations by means of money derived from the sale of Tuberculosis Christmas Seals, the removal of the job is made easier. It should be put over easily by the departments of education and health, the Parent Teacher Associations, the Women's Clubs and Seal Sale agencies cooperating.
