The Woman's Betterment Club will sponsor an ice cream supper at Maple Grove church Saturday evening, July 8. The public is invited to attend.

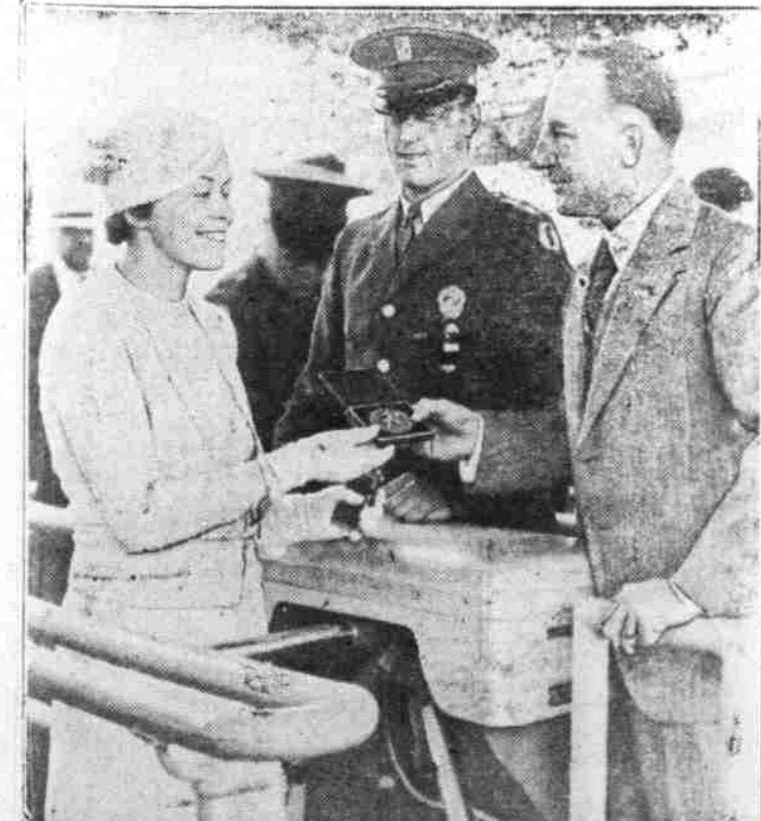
CAMPBELL REUNION JULY 9
