NINTH ANNUAL DISTRICT MEETING HELD HERE

A large attendance and a program featured by reports and addresses of unusual interest marked the ninth annual meeting of the First District of North Carolina Federation of Women's Club which was held Monday in the auditorium of the First Baptist church. The meeting was opened with a professional lead by the pages, Miss Edwina McDowell, Mrs. Carol Bell and Mrs. S. P. Gay which was composed of the state officers, state chairmen, club president-speakers and district officers. Miss Grace Crocker played March D. Major by Rebkoff as the group entered.

Among the prominent club women of the state present were: Mrs. R. H. Latham of Winston-Salem, State Federation president; Mrs. Howard Etheridge, of Asheville, second vice president; Mrs. E. L. McKee of Sylva and Miss Margaret Lovell Gibson, of Asheville, both past state federation president and several state chairmen. Mrs. R. N. Barber, district president presided over the meeting with Mrs. T. Lenoir Gwyn as secretary and Mrs. R. R. Taylor of Robinsville, as vice president.

Mrs. Latham in her address touched upon the vital responsibilities of the club women in the present era. She outlined the definite problem with which the club women are confronted today and suggested certain measures, that the women might take to remedy conditions. She spoke of the problem in the future of leisure time and it, a. e. She stated that the state federation approved retaining the 18th amendment. Action was taken later by the district in expressing its approval and endorsement of the amendment and opposition to its repeal. Mrs. Latham also expressed her great pleasure in being present and stated that the meeting Monday was the last district meeting of the year and that she had attended them all and that it was the one to have every club in the district present.

Mrs. Howard Etheridge, state chairman of districts outlined in a concrete manner the definite objectives of work as planned by the various state chairmen to be undertaken by the club women during the year, giving many new phases of work brought about by the present social and economic upheaval. Mrs. E. L. McKee, state chairman of citizenship, outlined the projects planned in her department. Mrs. Charles G. Guley, state chairman of music gave two delightful vocal selections accompanied by W. H. Patton of the faculty of the W. N. C. Teachers Training college. She also told of the plans of the music department of the state for the on-coming year.

The talks and reports were interspersed by music and vocal selections sponsored by members of the Junior Women's Clubs of Murphy, Andrews, Sylva, Cullowhee, and Canton. Adding much pleasure to the program were two violin solos by Mrs. Richard Neely Barber, Jr., accompanied by Mrs. Robert H. Stretcher.

The invocation was given by Mrs. Wade Johnson in opening the meeting. Mrs. Grover C. Davis, president of the Woman's Club of Waynesville, extended a welcome, in behalf of the four hostess clubs, the Community Club of which Mrs. Ben Collett is president, the Civic League of which Mrs. W. H. Luther is president and her own club and the Woman's Club of Clyde of which Mrs. M. E. Green is president. Mrs. John Sierra of Sylva responded.

Following the report of the district president in which he told of her work since her confirmation at the state meeting, those assembled were treated to the Masonic Temple where luncheon from attractively arranged tables was served. The blessing was given by Rev. H. W. Danson. Mrs. L. B. Hays gave a clever toast to "Our State" officers to which Mrs. Latham responded.

Lewis A. Smith was then introduced. Mr. Smith was a representative of the food and drug administration of the agricultural department sent out by the government to make a survey of sentiment regarding changing the law regulating the claims of advertisements of food, drugs and cosmetics. The district went on record as approving the proposed changes.

After which she introduced "Cherokee Lily," a native Cherokee girl who told of her life at the school on the Cherokee Reservation. Mrs. W. T. Crawford introduced Mrs. R. R. Campbell, granddaughter of Col. Thomas, who befriended the Cherokees.

Miss Louise Pittman spoke of the Brassstown school and explained some of the ideas of community life that are being worked out in that section.

Reports were given by the following chairmen of committees, courtesies, resolutions, Mrs. H. T. Hunter, Cullowhee; Mrs. N. R. Wild, Canton; and time and place, Mrs. H. Bueck of Murphy, who extended an invitation from the Murphy Senior and Junior Women's Clubs which was accepted.

The presidents of the following clubs gave the outstanding accomplishments of the year's work: Andrews Woman's Club, Bryson City Women's Club, Canton Women's Club, Clyde Woman's Club, Cullowhee Community Life Club, Murphy Woman's Club, Graham County Club of Robinsville, Twentieth Century Club of Sylva, C. S. League, Community Club and Woman's Club of Waynesville.

The meeting was closed with the reading of the minutes by the secretary with an invitation from the district president, Mrs. R. N. Barber, to all club women to a tea given by her at her home on Love Lane in compliment to the state officers. Mrs. Barber was assisted in receiving the guests by members of the local club and her daughters, Mrs. Richard Neely Barber, Jr., and Miss Mary Adsworth Barber with the receiving line being composed of the state officers and chairmen.

The Halloween motif which had prevailed in the luncheon appointments was used in a colorful decorative note throughout the spacious Barber residence. In the dining room, where punch and cake were served from an attractively arranged table, orange flowers and brilliant red leaves were contained in pleasing effect. The central table was covered with a harmonious lace cloth and featured by a crystal bowl of orange flowers and fernery. Lighted yellow tapers added a charm to all the reception rooms. Most of the 135 delegates attending the meeting remained over for this delightful social affair.
