Local Reemployment Board Explains Its Position To Work

Some Wonder Why They Haven't Received Work, Facts Are Given In Full

The Reemployment Committee of Haywood county desires that the public know that there are more than the C. W. A. branch of the National Administration acting in this county. The Civil Works Administration, the Welfare Department under whose control comes the various projects of the Federal Emergency Relief and numerous other branches of work effecting women employed from the relief rolls of Haywood county; the Tennessee Valley Project which employs men registered in the reemployment office but who had formerly filled out application direct with them; the National Park project which also employs men registered in the reemployment office but who at the same time, reserve, the right to select their men regardless of this office; as these men are not counted against the Haywood county quota of men.

The Welfare Department acts independently of the Reemployment office. In other words the women employed direct by Mr. Homer Henry's department are paid from relief fund of F. E. R. A. and are not paid by the C. W. A. and are not taken from the quota allowed the C. W. A. for this county and the Reemployment committee has nothing to do with their employment or non-employment as they merely are asked to furnish lists of those registered and needy and the Welfare department makes their own investigation of the individual and may employ them or others who might be eligible to the relief work under their welfare department regulations.

The Reemployment committee acts in the capacity of placing or placing men on the various C. W. A. and projects which come under the C. W. A. payroll and where the men so placed are taken from the regular quota allowed for Haywood county. In no instance can men be placed on a project over the number called for when the project is approved in Raleigh.

The work for women registered in this county for relief work comes under the direct supervision of the welfare department. The Reemployment committee does not place or employ these women but may, upon request from the welfare department, make up a list of all women registered and hand the same to the welfare department for their information and investigation.

A number of people are sending members of the committee over the phone about certain placements. The person so interested should ask to speak to the department responsible for the particular placements and information will be gladly given. It is the desire of the Reemployment office in Waynesville, N. C., under the direct control of Mr. L. B. Limer, manager, W. T. Shelton, W. A. Hyatt, H. A. Osborne, J. H. Howell Mrs. D. H. Alley, W. C. Russ and W. R. Francis, committee, to serve this county's unemployed and needy, faithfully, impartially and without pay so far as each member of the committee is concerned.

This office is being kept open by the Government to serve the unemployed. Every man and woman unemployed is entitled to register for work. However that does not assure them of securing work under the Civil Works Administration. The regulations and rules as laid down to the Reemployment committee, by the Civil Works Administration must be adhered to and followed. However the Reemployment office is asking various concerns companies and individuals who are in need of men or women to come to the reemployment office and go over the files of registered applicants. This office maintains this service FREE. It is the desire of the manager and the committee to assist as many people to secure work as it is possible to do.

IMPROVED UNIFORM INTERNATIONAL SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

LESSON FOR JANUARY 21
JESUS BEGINS HIS MINISTRY

LESSON OBJECT: KNOW WHO JESUS IS.
TEXT: MATTHEW 3:1-12.
SYNOPSIS: JOHN THE BAPTIST PREPARED THE WAY FOR JESUS BY BAPTIZING HIM IN THE JORDAN.
REFERENCES: MATTHEW 3:1-12.
QUESTIONS: 1. Who was John the Baptist? 2. What did he do? 3. Why did he baptize Jesus? 4. What did Jesus say to him? 5. What did John say to him? 6. What did Jesus say to the people? 7. What did John say to the people? 8. What did Jesus say to the people? 9. What did John say to the people? 10. What did Jesus say to the people?

Matthew's purpose was to present Jesus the Messiah as King. Jesus speaking his official ministry began at his baptism. So far as his preaching was concerned the present lesson is properly designated "Jesus Begins His Ministry."
I. The King His Own Herald (v. 1-12).
1. The reason for this (v. 1-12). The news of the imprisonment of John the Baptist caused Jesus to forsake Judaea and go into Galilee. The fact of John was accepted by Jesus as foreshadowing his own death. This was a point of pride on his part. When the people reject the truth and attempt to do violence to the messenger, there should be a turning from them unless significantly directed otherwise.

2. To whom the proclamation was made (v. 13-15). It was to the people at Capernaum in fulfillment of Isaiah's prophecy (Isa. 61, 2). This is a section of the country most overrun by the various nations and those people most exposed to the blighting effects of war. Thus we see that the darkest and most corrupt of the peoples was first to get the light. In this we see a foreshadowing of the passage of time when the power of the world is to be broken and the Kingdom of God is to be established on earth.

3. His message (v. 16-17). He came to baptize with water. This is the same baptism which the Baptist and Jesus had. The message was to repent and be baptized. The time is coming when the Kingdom of God will be established on earth and the King himself will come forth from the heavens to establish his mediatorial Kingdom. It is for this we pray when we intently say "Thy Kingdom come."

II. The King Calling to Himself Assistants (v. 18-22).

1. His command of authority (v. 18, 19). He did not try to persuade them by the use of arguments but issued a mandate. To command is the prerogative of a King.
2. The station of the servants called (v. 18, 21). They were men of lowly birth and occupation. These men were busy engaged in service when the Lord issued the call.
3. To what they were called (v. 20). They were called to definite service. "I will make you fishes of men." He had previously called them to be disciples (Matt. 10:1-2). He now called them to service. The quality which made for good fishers of men, is the willingness to face the storm and the night, the perseverance which kept at night though no fish were caught would make them good fishers of men.

III. The King's Triumphant Progress (v. 23-25).

1. The prompt obedience (v. 23, 25). They put their trust in him who called, believing that he was able to supply their needs. When the King commands there is no time for delay.
2. The King's triumph (v. 24). He won the wide bounds of Galilee teaching the Scriptures, preaching the gospel of the Kingdom and baptizing a multitude of disciples. He did not call work.

1. Teaching the Scriptures (v. 23). The message was not to be preached, but to be lived. This was the primary basis of every Sunday school teacher and message.
2. Preaching the gospel (v. 24). The King who was his own King, was ready to baptize his own kingdom if they had been willing to receive him.
3. Hearing all manner of diseases (v. 23-25). There was no form of disease which he could not cure and so abundant was his success that this fame went throughout all Syria and they brought unto him all sick people that were taken with divers diseases and torments, and those which were possessed with devils, and those which were lame, and those that had the palsy, and he healed them.
