The county agent has just received a letter calling for sixty pounds of Linden or basswood seed.

It is encouraging to find that so many of our farmers have collected and saved their walnuts.

All walnuts should be hulled and placed in the dry and kept there until marketed.

TO PREPARE BLACK WALNUT KERNELS

Gather the nuts as soon as they drop. Remove the hull and spread the nuts and allow to dry.

When thoroughly dry, crack the nuts and pick out the kernels.

Use a one-sixth inch screen and sift out all screenings and granules which have no value and will make the whole shipment bring a much lower price if left in.

Walnut kernels are a food product, so they should be nice plump kernels, bright and clean, free from shells and well cured.

By following the above rules you will have fine quality, which will secure ready market, and the best price. Poor quality is hard to sell at even a low price.

A renewed outcry of "government in business" followed disclosure that the FERA is studying a plan to use millions of unemployed in the manufacture of goods.

Eventually it is estimated, as many as ten million unemployed would be put to work in this way.

The plan embraces the conversion of cotton into knitting yarns, and the knitting fabric and other clothing, the making of rugs and carpets, such food products as may be based on produce from cattle brought by the government in the drought areas.

The Reconstruction Finance Corporation, established in February 9, 1932, has authorized and loaned up to October 31st, \$8,445,344, 137.85.
