

### Predicts Increase In Insurance Rates

Raleigh—Unless highway accidents in North Carolina decrease, William DeR. Scott, newly-elected president of the State Association of Insurance Agents, predicts, insurance companies will raise their rates in this state.

Addressing the Raleigh insurance exchange club, he said insurance rates would rise or fall with the frequency of automobile accidents on the road. Should there be a marked decrease he ventured, rates would be reduced within 12 months.

### Congress Reaches Half-Year Mark

WASHINGTON—In a turbulent session, variedly different from that which spanned through early New Deal legislation, congress has passed out four major administrative measures and backed a grand many proposals approved by the President.

As the half-year mark in the legislative score was reached Saturday the lawmakers had yet to finish work on such key bills as Roosevelt measures on the utility holding company bill, the omnibus bank bill to give the Federal reserve board power to control currency and credit, and amendments to bolster the AAA against court attack.

The social security bill, which the President has indicated he regards as the most important of all the legislation pending in congress, had passed both houses and seemed destined to become law within a short time.

## COUNTY AGENT W. D. SMITH'S column

All tobacco contract signers who had tenants growing tobacco on their farms in 1933 and 1934 please read the following statement:

The first adjustment check on the 1933 crop must be divided with the tenants who were on the place making tobacco in 1934.

The second adjustment check which is on the 1934 crop is to be divided with the tenants who made the 1934 crop.

The division of these payments is exactly the same as the division made when the crops were sold at the warehouse.

We are about ready now to attend to the compliances for the 1935 tobacco crops under contract. Super-visors to measure the acreage have been selected and are as follows:

Beverlydale and Cople townships—John Travis.

Fivefork townships—J. C. Harrison.

Jonathan and Whitewater townships—S. W. Crout.

Cherokee and Iron Duff townships—J. C. Travis.

Waynesville and Iron Hill townships—A. M. Hill.

Bassett, York and East Fork townships—R. A. Coker.

The supervisors will begin measuring the tobacco acreage this week. They will try to get the work finished as early as possible at the time of the sale in order that each producer may be present when his acreage is measured. It is the duty of every producer to be there and assist with the measuring, or have someone there who can help with the measuring. The compliance blanks must be signed by the producer also. We had the full cooperation of the producers in this

operation of the producers in this work last year and we anticipate that we will have full cooperation again this year. If every producer will remember that failure to comply means greater cost per contract, it should lessen the cost per contract this year. Every county agent connected with the Haywood County Tobacco Growers Association is determined to lessen the cost of our association if possible. Please help us to do the job better and at a lesser cost.

Either Mr. Smith, the county agent or Mr. Crouse, the assistant county agent, will be in charge of the Chamber of Commerce Saturday afternoon about two o'clock and will stay an hour or so for the convenience of any farmers of Beverlydale township who wish to confer with them but cannot come to Waynesville. If there is some question you wish to ask of them bring it to the Chamber of Commerce.

From time to time farmers who have good plots of food crops to sell come into the County Agents office and tell us to let anyone know who is interested. The office would be glad if a system of information exchange could be established so that our farmers would have something to sell would get his produce and anyone looking for something to eat. It is a good idea for our people to know of some good things to buy and to sell.

Last week we visited several potato fields on Jonathan Creek. Some of these should be kept for seed. In one field the grower had already gone through and pulled stakes beside every diseased plant. If we could get our growers to follow this practice and take out every diseased plant as they show up we could make our potato crop much better.

Indications are now that potato prices will be very high next year. Haywood County farmers cannot expect to get ahead in the potato game and buy high priced seed each year. We can grow as good seed as any section of the country if we will do the same thing that other seed growers practice. Three things are necessary. Keep all diseased plants rogued out, treat the seed before planting, and store the seed where they will keep properly.

Already some of our tomato growers are reporting blossom-rot on the young tomatoes. If you do not already have a sprayer get one and get busy with Bordeaux and keep your tomato plants sprayed. A little attention in this way will mean more tomatoes and better tomatoes.

We have a good showing for a bean crop at the present time. Our growers have whipped the bean beetle. If they will keep up with their work and spray we will produce a bumper crop this season.

The American Guernsey Cattle Club is offering to award rosettes for the first five prizes in each of the Guernsey calf club classes for county shows.

Every boy or girl who has a good Guernsey calf should think seriously about fitting it for showing, and get in touch with Mr. Crouse, the assistant county agent, at once in order that he can give some help or information about getting them ready. We need to know how many, if any calves might be entered in this class. So far most of the calf club work has been with beef calves.

How many calves are you getting ready for the Haywood County Fair the week of October 8th?

Mr. F. R. Farnham, State Extension Dairy Specialist, will be in the county two days this month, Monday and Tuesday, the 28th and 29th. We plan to have some dairy meetings in the county at that time and are anxious
