

Two Young Indians Bound To Federal Court For Murder

Two Cherokee Indians Being Held For Murder In Swain County Last Week

Walter Calhoun and Allen Long, young Cherokee Indians, were bound over to the November term of Federal court in Bryson City without bond by United States Commissioner W. T. Shelton, here Monday, charged with the murder of Westly Driver, 64, who died in the Bryson City hospital Sunday, August 18th, from injuries alleged to have been inflicted by Calhoun.

In a deathbed statement, Driver stated that Calhoun hit him in the head with a rock, following an argument over six cents, which Driver seems to have won in a bow and arrow shooting contest engaged in by the three.

Long is said to have chased the old man around the inside of his house with an open pocket knife. Immediately after the affray, the defendants went into the woods to await until the two left before coming out.

Sheriff J. H. Sea, of Swain county, and G. H. Martin, of Bryson City, told of visiting Driver in the hospital, where he told the same story as was made in the deathbed statement. The defendants were arrested by Sheriff Sea and lodged in jail.

T. S. Garrison, U. S. probation and parole officer of this district, testified that he talked to Calhoun in jail and he admitted throwing the rock which hit Driver. Long has been on probation.

L. E. Lepecier, special deputy on the reservation, told of events leading up to the fatal affray, as gathered by him after an investigation.

The two defendants made no statement concerning the case, although they were informed of all proceedings by G. L. George, an interpreter.

Former Senator Roy Francis, now assistant district attorney, represented the government in the case.

Several Cherokees were present at the hearing.
