## MRS. LOVE HOSTESS TO MUSIC CLUB

Of exceptional interest was the meeting on Saturday afternoon of the Waynesville Music Club, which was held at the home of the president, Mrs. Hedwig Love. For the occasion a color motif of red, white and blue, significant of the 22nd, was noted in both the flowers and serving appointments.

Special guests of the afternoon were: Mrs. W. H. Davis, Mrs. William Ray Griffin, and Mrs. Frank Smith, of Asheville, all prominent in the State Federation of Music Clubs and the members of the Waynesville Junior Music Club.

Mrs. Lucile Foy, was in charge of the program, with Spanish music as the topic of the afternoon. It was an international exchange program, and while the local club was having this Spanish program a music club in Spain was devoting an afternoon to the study of American music.

Mrs. Foy first outlined the history of the folk song in Spain and how it had developed other forms of music. Several selections were given, each illustrating some period or phase or characteristic of development of Spanish music. First of the group was a Catalonian Nativity song, by a quartet composed of Mrs. Olive Green, Mrs. Tom Sparlock, Miss Margaret Walker, and Miss Mildred Crawford, with Miss Grace Crocker, as the accompanist.

In contrast Miss Crocker played "Habanera," from Bizet's opera, "Carmen," showing the lighter manner of the rypsy rhythm of the Castilian. As an example of the tropical grace and melody Mrs. Olive Green and Miss Margaret Walker sang "La Paloma." Miss Mildred Crawford sang "Mi Viejo Amor," in Spanish, using two Spanish musical instruments, the guacharo and malaca, to accentuate the rhythm. She was accompanied by Miss Grace Crocker at the piano.

An illustration of the manner in which composers are using their folk music was demonstrated with two piano numbers by Miss Grace Crocker, dance rhythm, "Spanish Dance," by Enrique Granados, and "Tango," by Isaac Albeniz.

At the close of the program, as is the custom, with international programs presented in America, the group sang "The Star Spangled Banner."

Two vocal numbers were presented by Mary Stentz, young daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. Dale Stentz, and Dorothy Richeson, young daughter of Mr. and Mrs. L. M. Richeson, who are entering the district music contest.

During the brief business session plans for the coming district meeting were discussed. Among the guests were Mrs. Dewey Stovall, Mrs. R. N. Barber, and Mrs. N. F. Lancaster.
