**Health Examinations Being Given 4-H Club Members In County**

**Membership In 4-H Clubs In County Is Steadily Increasing, And Good Attendance**

This week thorough health examinations are being given to all 4-H club members in the 4 organized clubs in the county, namely, Clyde High school, Beaverdam school, Fines Creek High school, and Rock Hill school. This means that about 255 club members are being given an opportunity to find out how they rate physically, if there are physical defects to concentrate on their weak points and develop better bodies. Dr. Sisk, district health officer, and Mrs. Jean Dillon, supervisor of public health nursing, are co-operating with the home demonstration agent and assistant county agents and the schools in making the examinations. In June a second check will be made of the physical progress of the outstanding club members and it is hoped that some of them may be winners in the district or even state 4-H Health contest. Health programs are being held in all of the clubs this week following the examinations.

Individual club members in communities which do not have organized clubs may have the same examination and an opportunity to compete in the county health contest if they will come to the health department office in the court house on Saturday mornings.

Membership in 4-H clubs is continually increasing and attendance and interest in all meetings is very good. Now that spring has come practically all projects are under way or are being specifically planned.

The county council of the 4-H clubs, comprised of the officers of the individual clubs, will meet Saturday afternoon at 2:00 o'clock to make plans for the April meetings of the clubs.

All home demonstration clubs in the county have held their March meetings except Fines Creek, which will meet Thursday afternoon at 1:30 with Mrs. Reeves Noland. Attendance at the various meetings this month was as follows:
