

### Outstanding Athletes From Hazelwood To Graduate From Local High School

Indications Are That Good Football Team Will Be Had Next Year Inspite Of Graduation

True it is some time until the next athletic season for the Waynesville High School Mountaineers; nevertheless, the people in this sport-minded town are interested in knowing what the prospects are for a successful campaign along the sport front, which has its beginning next September. From the bootblack upward in position to bank presidents, football fans would like to know just what the outlook is for Coach Carleton Weatherly to again place an outstanding eleven in the thick of the 1936 fight for honors in Western North Carolina.

Judging from a recent list of graduates and from the fact that the Mountaineers had an outstanding last season, it appears almost a certainty that Coach Weatherly will have a host of athletic material for football, basketball, and track to greet him when the first calls are made during the next school year. Co-Captain Lawson Summerrow of the Mountaineer eleven and Captain Sara Welch of the Blue Ridge Conference champion basketball team will be two of the chief losses taken by graduation. Other losses to be sorely missed from the coming sport program will be "Bill" Swift, "Bud" Blalock, Clarence Hyatt, Dick Whissenhunt, Ruby Burgess, Wade Franklin, Robert Gillett, Joan Phillips, Gerald Rathbone, Jack Sease, and Hazel Winkler. Of this group Summerrow, Swift, Burgess, Welch, Franklin, Phillips, Rathbone, and Sease were listed as regulars; however, with the exception of Summerrow and the regulars of the basketball team, splendid reserves are ready to assume command of first string positions.

Few new names will need to appear on the new edition of Coach Weatherly's football team. Chafin, Byrd, Cathey, Sawyer, Stringfield, Bryson, Schulhofer, Reeves, Yount, and Moore are ten regulars not having their names on the graduating list, who will, with the aid of some splendid prospects, write the gridiron history of the Mountaineers of the approaching campaign.

To further answer the question so often asked at this time of year; otherwise, "Who will graduate from the athletic teams?" it appears that the basketball squad will move upward. Cathey, Chafin, Moore, Smith, Stentz, Reeves, and others will return for the boy's outfit, while Rogers, Jones, and Milner of the regulars, and Palmes, Wyatt, and Messer of the reserves, will form the base of another girl's organization. With the new gymnasium in the junior high, a newly formed athletic club for Freshmen, and a proposed program of athletic competition among the various elementary schools for next year, the outlook for sports during the coming season and following year, appears to be very encouraging.

Sport fans will also enjoy a splendid improvement in facilities to care for spectators with the new stadium and gymnasium expected to be completed before school opens next fall. Furthermore, the Blue Ridge Conference will give eight or ten teams, representing schools of about equal enrollment, an opportunity to battle for honors in both basketball and football, and the Haywood county cham-

ship in football, basketball, and track will have to be decided for another season.

#### WHITE OAK PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH

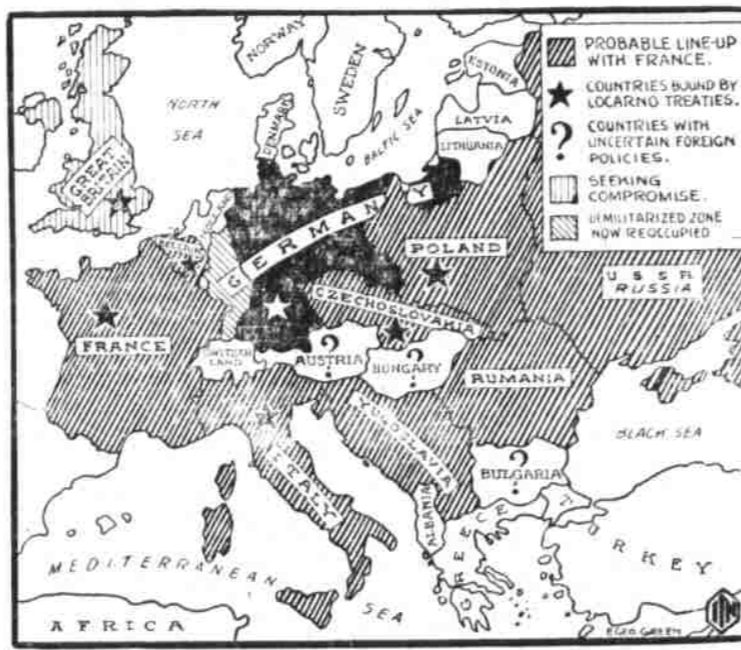
The pastor will preach at the nursing service next Sunday, March 22.

Cornell University athletic authorities have officially confirmed the appointment of Carl G. Snavely, of the University of North Carolina as new head coach of football, replacing "Gloomy" Gill Dobias. Snavely, head coach at the University for the past two seasons, will take charge at Ithaca, N. Y., this spring under a three-year contract, understood to call for an annual salary of \$5,500.
