In order to plan an intelligent and effective program of assistance for persons with defective vision Mr. Penland said, it is first necessary to know their number, the extent of their visual disability and their individual situation. With the aid of churches and schools, local civic clubs, and other interested persons, Mr. Penland hopes to compile a list of all persons in his ferritory who are unpersons in his territory who are unable, through poor sight, to read, even with the use of glasses. 
