## Napoleon Adopted Bees as Symbol of Activity


The bees, as the symbol of Napo leon's dynasty, are said to have had their origin in the following manner, according to a writer in the Washington Start,

In the year 1653, the tousb of Childeric, the father of Clovis, was opened, and the valuable contents removed. The skeletons of Childeric's war horse and of his page were found ; also, about 100 small objects which the French heralds mistook for bees "of purest gold their wings being inlaid with a not stanelike cornelian."

Although these small ornaments resemiled nees, they were in reality what is known as "fleurons," and were supposed to have been attached to the trappings of the war horse, Later, they were sent to Louis XIV, but it was not until the time of Napoleon that they were given any real significance. He adopted the "bee" as a symbol of the enterprise and activity which his reim represented, and he caused the symbols to be sprinkled profusely over the imperial robes.
