

Tar Heel Mountaineers Worried As War Slashes "Sang" Demand

Results Of Sino-Jap Conflict Felt ten years to grow to a good size.

In This Area As Ginseng

Root Exports Drop

undeclared Sino-Japanse The war is affecting the livelihood of numerous Appalachian Mountain folk.

The conflict is reducing the demand for ginseng root, which grows in Western North Carolina's mountain fastnesses.

Ginseng-called "sang" by the hill dwellers who have gathered it for more than a century-is an aromatic root highly valued as a medicine in China. It has a sweet taste like licorice, but is of little use, medical men say, except as a demulcent.

The Chinese, however, ascribe almost supernatural healing powers to the root. For centuries the Orientals gathered their native supply, but this gradually lessened. Regarding a shortage as near tragedy, they then began to import the commodity. The Chinese use ginseng for every possible household and medical pur-

The Eastern North American species of ginseng was discovered near Montreal, Quebec, in 1716, Shortly afterward the first shipment of the wild root went to China, and soon a steady trade was established.

The mountaineer sells his ginseng to the herb dealer who, in turn, sells it to wholesalers or Chinese agents in New York or other commercial centers.


