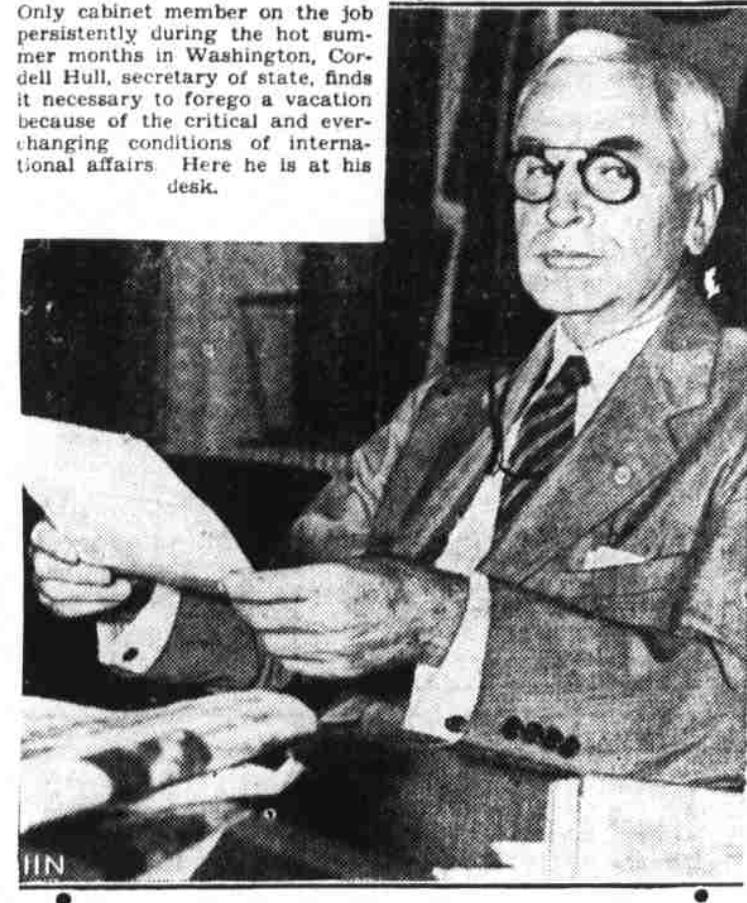
J. T. M. CONNATSER
