

North Carolina Gets Portraits Of Signers

Archibald Henderson, well-known historian, biographer, and mountaineer, presented to the University of North Carolina three framed copies in honor of the three North Carolina signers of the Constitution of the United States.

The three portraits, which are to hang in the office of Dean R. B. House in South Building, are of William Blount, Richard Dobbs Spaight, and Hugh Williamson.

The Blount portrait is after an oil painting by Albert Rosenthal in the Independence Hall Museum, in Philadelphia; the portrait of Paignt is after a drawing by Charles St. Meemin, also in Independence Hall Museum, and Williamson's portrait is from an oil by John Trumbull which cannot now be found.

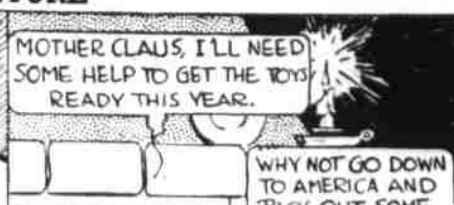

W. N. C. Snow Scene One Of Many Promoted By Civic Group Leaders

The designs selected by a committee appointed by Gov. Clyde R. Hoey, submitted six scenic photographs representing the various sections of the state and those scenes have been transposed into outstanding greeting cards. On viewing the completed cards Gov. Hoey made the following statement:

"I wish to give hearty approval to the North Carolina Christmas cards being issued and sold by the North Carolina Junior Chamber of Commerce. The designs selected by the committee appointed by me represent attractive views of different sections of the state. Appropriate Christmas messages accompany these beautiful North Carolina scenes and the cards will furnish a fine opportunity to remind friends throughout the United States of North Carolina during the holiday season.

"I trust that many of our citizens will find occasion to use these cards. The Junior Chamber of Commerce will have them on sale throughout the state. (Signed)

Each of the three particular sections of the state is represented by two cards and the photographs have been reproduced to "tip" on the front of the folded cards will be suitable for collectors in their efforts to provide albums of North Carolina scenes. 45 Cents And An Idea Did Wonders

Seven years ago, John Pedersen was out of work, possessed of 45 cents but was the father of an idea. Today, he can and is building houses in Dacine, Wis., and selling them on a basis of no down payment and no interest on the unpaid balance.

His plan operates thus: Owner of a tract of land, he builds low-cost homes and turns them over to clients, who pay monthly installments ranging from \$17.50 to \$25. The payments continue for two years, after which the client may take

Garland McPherson, of Rocky Mount, general chairman of the project, stated that the entire state administration is lending valuable assistance to provide appropriate North Carolina scenes and Christmas messages for the cards. Those same agencies are also assisting with the promotion of the entire idea.

"We have not entered into the project for a profit," said Dallas L. Alford, Jr., president of the North Carolina Junior Chamber of Commerce, "and any profit which we might make over our expenses will be used for charitable purposes. Our chief objective is to assist with the general advertising program of the state."

The state department of revenue has ruled that the cards are a part of the official program of the state and will not be taxed under the sales tax act.

Soon they were selling tiebacks by the thousands.

Mr. Pedersen bought a 45-acre farm near Racine, found a city man didn't make such a good farmer, and decided to sub-divide and go into the real estate business.

Mr. Pedersen saw quickly that lot buyers aren't successful in building their own houses, so he began erecting plain but durable houses for sale.
