Over \$64,000 Paid Unemployed Here

Haywood county has 3422 employees covered by the State Unemployment Compensation Act, who received \$6,106,098 in wages in the 18 months period to June 30, 1938, paid by 30 covered employers. These employers paid in contributions to the State Unemployment fund \$126,412.94. This amount paid by the employers of this county was 1.08 per cent of the amount paid by all of the 100 counties. The unemployed or partially unemployed workers in this county for the first 11 months of 1938, received in unemployment benefits \$64,479.88, which is 82 per cent of the benefits paid to all of the unemployed or partially unemployed workers in North Carolina during the first 11 months of benefit payments.
