Stockholders Hear Best Report In 4 Years. Board Of Directors Elected

The report submitted by S. H. Bushnell, secretary, to the stockholders of the Haywood Home Building and Loan Association, at their 20th annual meeting held Tuesday night, showed are still coming in. the affairs of the association to be in the best condition they have been in the past four years.

A remarkable record was noted in the disposal of real estate covering the past year as well as a three year period. In 1938 the association started the year with \$21,621.86 in real estate. It acquired through loans during the year, \$25,000 and sold \$35,733 worth, leaving on hand at present only \$10,888 in real estate. Three and half years ago, the association had real estate totaling \$116,-000 on hand.

Mr. Ray continued: "It is a public necessity that more of the park area be made available to the public, and conditions anticipated this summer will bring unfavorable comment on the Park Service."



er Into Agreement For

Mutual Benefit

Hazelwood has purchased a fire truck from the American La France Fire Fighting Equipment Company, which will be delivered within the next sixty days, according to a statement made by Whitener Prevost,

The truck will be turned over to the Waynesville fire department and will become the property of the town of Waynesville. In return, an agreement has been made between the two towns for Waynesville to defray all operating expenses and up-keep of the truck, and service all fires in Hazelwood, for a period of twelve

For several years the Waynesville fire department has been answering all calls from Hazelwood free of any charge as a friendly service to a neighbor in trouble.

The addition of another truck to the would reduce the mercantile buildings 5 cents as fire risks, and the merchandise 6 cents. There is a possibility, when the new rating is made for the town, that there will be an additional cut in the fire risks for both these groups.

One Per Cent Penalty Goes On All Unpaid '38 Taxes After 1st

County Has Already Collected 60 Per Ceat Of Current Levy; Will Start Garnisheeing

Warning has been issued to taxpayers that a penalty of one per cent will be added on all unpaid 1938 taxes

unless paid before February first. An addition of one per cent will be added for the next four months, after which time the property will be advertised for the unpaid taxes, it was explained by the tax collectors.

W. H. McCracken, tax supervisor and collector of Haywood county, is giving notice this week that he will be forced to start garnisheeing after the first of the month on all unpaid taxes on personal property.

To date, sixty per cent of the couny's levy has been collected, Mr. McCeacken pointed out. The 1938 levy was \$396,761.96.
