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

Renew the Old Strawberry Bed.

Immediately after the strawberry renewed. Reduce the width of each bean beetle. row to about six inches by plowing up part of the row. This may be done ing the aphids or plant lice feeding on by plowing up one side of the row, or by plowing on each side, leaving a plants. strip of plants 6 inches wide. This strip should be thinned of plants, removing as many old plants as possible, leaving the remaining ones around 18 inches apart. Plow up the middles and the small blossom bud clusters. between the strips and continue cultivation throughout the summerture at the rate of 5 to 7 pounds per quart of bran or meal, 100 feet of row or 1 to 2 pounds of a mixture containing equal parts of nitrate of soda and cotton seed meal.


