Hatchery Pools Pictured On **Magazine Cover**

A picture of the rearing pools and zoo of the Morrison Hatchery featured the front cover of the March issue of the North Carolina Wildlife Conservation, and monthly publication of the Department

of Conservation and Development. The publication gave the following explanation: "The large pools used for rearing trout at the Morrison Hatchery, Waynesville, have been developed to meet the specific needs of this plant and surrounding trout water.

"The pools are 60 feet in diameter and are from 6 to 9 feet in depth. They have a capacity of 100,000 one-inch fingerling trout, or about 25,000 five-inch fish. The pools have natural gravel bottoms and have been very efficient producers of disease free trout."

Survey Shows 19-Year Group Is Most Arrested

ST. LOUIS .- An analysis of reports of the federal bureau of investigation by G. Myron Gwinner, executive secretary of the bureau of men, shows that the "most arrested" age group in the nation is that of the 19-year-olds.
