

County Livestock Show Officers to Meet Saturday

Farmers and Business Men Invited to Meet and Help Plan 1941 Show

The officers and directors of the Haywood County Livestock show will hold a meeting at 2 o'clock Saturday afternoon in the court house here.

All livestock men, and farmers throughout the county and business men are invited to join the group for a discussion of plans for the second annual county livestock show which will be staged in the fall.

Last year around \$450 was given in prizes to the winners in the various classes. This year the officers hope to increase the prize list.

Due to the success of the 1940 show and the interest it stimulated throughout the county tentative plans for this year call for larger showing of animals, and also a display of handicrafts by the members of the county home demonstration clubs.

Officers will also be elected at the meeting on Saturday. Claude C. Francis is president of the group that staged the show of last year. Other officers included Jarvis L. Palmer, first vice president; W. A. Bradley, second vice president; W. A. Medford, Jr., secretary and treasurer, and Jonathan Woody general superintendent.

Citizens of Clyde are referring to the two tickets this year as the "old" and "new." The so-called "new" ticket is headed by Glenn Brown, candidate for mayor, with Claud Rogers, Bruce Sellars and Howard Shook as candidates for aldermen.

The other ticket is made up of W. G. Smathers, for mayor, C. A. Mooney, T. H. Rogers and Gerald Fish for aldermen.

Jeter Hawkins is a candidate for aldermen on an independent ticket. For judge of police court, Larry H. Cagle is seeking re-election and is opposed by Jack West.

J. Paul Murray is seeking re-election and is being opposed by J. T. Bailey, former mayor and former representative of Haywood in the General Assembly.

Five candidates are on the ticket for aldermen, with Roy H. Patton, A. B. Robinson and Clyde R. Hoey, Jr., running as a team, and Fred Pressley and Floyd (Flossie) Dewese as independents.
