## Death Given As Unavoidable

Unavoidable death was the verdict of the jury at the coroner's inquest held in Asheville on Monday morning over the death of Allen Whitted, 45, of the Candler section who was struck by an automobile driven by W. T. Crawford, local attorney around 9:15 Saturday

It was brought out at the inquest that a passing car had blinded Mr. Crawford so that when he discovered him walking about 15 feet ahead he swerved his car and the man moved in the same direction so that the accident was unavoidable.

Mr. Whitted was rushed to an Asheville hospital and lived until

about 3:15 Sunday morning. The accident occurred two and a half miles South of Candler near the T. L. Miller store.

### 169,095 Persons **Visited Park During June**

A total of 169,095 persons, in 51,005 vehicles, visited the Great Smoky Mountains National Park during the month of June.

This was an increase of 32 per cent over travel to this park during June, 1940, and brings travel for the travel year to date well over the half-million mark, and 35 per cent ahead of the corresponding period for 1940 (travel year-October of one year through September 30 of the next). The visitors were from all 48 states, the District of Columbia, Hawaii, Panama, the Philippine Islands, Cuba, Central and South Americas, and two Canadian provices. Fiftythree per cent of the visitors were of Tennessee and North Carolina, in which states the park is located. Tennessee furnished the most

The lifting of the sales tax of 3 per cent on Tuesday, July 1st, from North Carolina's breadbasket will save the housewives of Haywood county approximately \$35,000 a year, according to local authorities, estimate based on the state figures and those of other coun-The housewives of the state will

be saved a total of more than \$2,-000,000, state authorities claim. The removal of the tax is the result of a bill passed in the last legislature, which was one of the main planks in the platform of Governor Broughton in his campaign.

From now on all food products used in the preparation of the exempt. However, the three per cent tax will continue to be collected on many household articles purchased at grocery stores, such as candy, mops, bluing, soaps, and

other supplies of this type.
"If housewives," says J. B. Vogler, who introduced the bill in the General Assembly, "will only keep in mind that all food for human consumption is tax free and that everything else is taxable there (Continued on page 12)

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
