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Classification Of Men Being Discharged

The War Department has authorized the discharge of certain men in the armed forces and the relief of others from active federal service it was learned here this week.

Men inducted through Selective Service, who have served their twelve months and are released from active service, are transferred by the army to the Enlisted Reserve Corps. However, a man discharged for some specific reason prior to completion of his twelve months' service, being separated from any military organization, is subject to reclassification under the Selective Training and Service Act.

National Guardsmen given a discharge severing relations with all military organizations, if within the age of 21-36, are required to register under the Selective Training and Service Act and are subject to its requirements. They are also privileged to enlist in the Enlisted Reserve Corps or in the National Guard.

National Guardsmen, not discharged, but relieved from active federal military service and returned as National Guardsmen to state control and state status, are not subject to registrations or other requirements of the Selective Service.
