Music Club Hears Paper On Life Of Paderewski

Mrs. J. Dale Stentz had the paper of the afternoon at the initial meeting of the Waynesville Music Club held after the summer vacation. Mrs. Henry Foy and Miss Ida Jean Brown were associate hostesses and the meeting was held Saturday afternoon in the Sunday school rooms of the Presbyterian church.

Mrs. Stentz reviewed "Paderewski's Memoirs", giving the important events in the life of this famous musician. She stated he was born in 1860 in a village in Russian Poland and suffered many hardships during boyhood. He began to play at the age of three years in 1869, at 25 he began to study with Leschetizky, the famous Polish teacher, in Vienna. He began his American tours in 1891.

Mrs. Stentz also pointed out his ardent love for his native land and how during the World War he and his wife worked for relief for their people. He was made first premier of Poland in 1919. It was largely through his efforts that the Allies were led to declare in favor of the re-creation of "a united independent Polish State". He died in New York on June 26, 1941.

Paderewski's compositions include an opera, a suite for the orchestra and many piano selections. Mrs. Troy Wyche played his best known piano composition, "Minuet in G". Mrs. R. H. Stretcher, in recognition of Paderewski's starring in the motion picture which was built around the "Moonlight Sonata", played the first movement from this well known composition.

Mrs. L. M. Richeson, chairman, distributed the year books for the current year, and announced that the club would continue the study of the volume "Discovering Music" by McKinney and Anderson.
