

Million And Quarter People Visited Park During Travel Year

September Of 1941 Broke All Records For Travel Into Great Smokies.

The greatest travel year in its history has come to a close in the Great Smoky Mountains National Park.

For the first time since its establishment as a National Park, over a million persons have visited this park during a travel year. A total of 1,247,019 persons, traveling in 382,133 vehicles, visited the park during the period October 1, 1940, through September 30, 1941. This represents an increase of 45 per cent over travel for the 1940 travel year which up to this time has been the all time high figure in yearly travel.

Fifty-seven per cent of the visitors were from other than the local states of Tennessee and North Carolina. The visitors were from 48 states in the Union, the District of Columbia, Alaska, Hawaii, Panama, Canal Zone, Philippine Islands, and 21 foreign countries. There were more visitors from the state of Ohio than from the state of North Carolina in which state half of the park is located. States in number of visitors were (1) Tennessee, (2) Ohio, (3) North Carolina, (4) Illinois, (5) Indiana.

Last month contributed 146,259 persons, in 45,770 vehicles, to this total travel year figure. This September travel represented an increase of 24 per cent over travel for September, 1940.

Greatest travel during any one month since travel has been recorded was during August, 1941, when 326,827 persons visited the park. Greatest travel for any one day in the history of the park was on August 31, 1941, when 32,466 persons visited the park. Other outstanding days of travel during the year were July 4, when 21,361 persons visited the park, July 27, when 19,104 persons visited the park, August 10, when 20,270 persons visited the park, August 17, when 21,063 persons visited the park, August 24, when 19,739 persons visited the park.
